## "THE COMPLETE REPAIR"

Footage from Las Vegas World of Minis shows up on a lot of Motocross videos. In fact I have watched so much footage of this race, that I have wanted to attend for several years now. Yet another time, I had shattered the piston on my CR and did not have the money to have the cases split to clean out all of the fragments. So, my faithful wrench spinning partner Josh and I went to work. First, we took the motor out of the bike and removed the cylinder and what was left of the piston. Then we poured gasoline directly into the crankcase, swished it around, and turned the motor upside down to drain the gasoline. Following that process, we coated the crank with bearing grease, ran the crank through a couple of cycles, and then continued to pick metal fragments out of the grease. We repeated the gasoline technique, and then the grease operation many times over until we felt content in our minds that there were no more metal fragments left in the case. I am sure that the Saturday Night Live broadcast only being ten minutes away had nothing to do with our decision of completion. The repair was complete.

This ingenuity knew no bounds. My father had spent the better part of a summer perfecting the gutter system on our house. One fine fall afternoon, Josh and I sat on the porch of the house and watched as a small bird perched on the edge of the gutter. We then gasped in horror as my fathers summer project collapsed into a heap of plastic and metal.

- You've got to finish to win. Of course, you've got to be fast to win too, otherwise everybody would be doing it.
- There is no physical training regimen so strict that it can't be undermined by a rigorous program of deferred motorcycle maintenance.

- There are old racers and there are bold racers, but there are no old, bold racers who don't walk funny.
- Patience is a virtue of many racers. Unfortunately, it's also a virtue of a lot of losers.
- The wise racer only pisses off the people he can beat.
- The secret of successful race tuning is knowing when to start riding and stop tuning.
- If you're going to pray, pray for FACTORY intervention. Divine intervention isn't much use, since the guy upstairs isn't really all that up on the proper set-up.

## **Public Meetings Set for OHV National Strategy**

PICKERINGTON, Ohio -- Federal officials considering a national strategy for governing off-highway vehicles on Bureau of Land Management (BLM) property have scheduled a series of public meetings to gather comments, the American Motorcyclist Association (AMA) reports.

The BLM manages more than 264 million acres of public land in the West and Alaska. The agency wants public guidance in four areas:

- 1.) Land-use concerns, such as how to provide off-highway vehicle (OHV) recreational opportunities while providing for other public uses and protecting the environment.
- 2.) Resource concerns, such as the best ways to manage and monitor OHVs to protect natural, cultural and historic resources.
- 3.) Management tools, such as education, planning, and law enforcement.
- 4.) Legal considerations, including issues such as native American rights to use the land.

To tell the BLM you support off-highway vehicle use in designated areas of public land, and to offer suggestions on how to manage that use, write to:

### Senate Effort Fails to Stop Clinton Bans on Land Access

PICKERINGTON, Ohio -- The U.S. Senate has rejected a proposal that would have stopped President Clinton from unilaterally declaring millions of acres of public land off-limits to off-highway motorcycles and all-terrain vehicles, the American Motorcyclist Association (AMA) reports. By a narrow 50-49 vote on July 18, the Senate defeated an amendment offered by Senate Majority Whip Don Nickles (R-Oklahoma) to the Interior Department's appropriations bill. The amendment would have barred Clinton from designating any more federal land as national monuments. Without public comment or congressional debate, Clinton this year has designated nearly 2 million acres of federal land primarily in Arizona, California, Colorado, Oregon and Washington state as national monuments, which bars off-highway vehicle use.

Using a 1906 law that allows him to designate national monuments without congressional approval, Clinton hopes to declare another 2 million acres by the end of the year.

"We have no problems with national monuments," says Robert Rasor, the AMA's vice president for government relations. "But the president is closing off millions of acres of public land to motorcyclists with the stroke of a pen, without including the public in the decision on how the land should be managed. "We believe monument designations should be made after full public debate, an examination of the facts, and a congressional vote -- not through presidential fiat," Rasor said. "The monument designations are just

part of the Clinton administration effort to ban OHVs from tens of millions of acres of public land nationwide through administrative procedures before Clinton leaves office at the end of the year."

Republican senators from western states where the land is being designated pushed the Nickles proposal. But six GOP senators broke party ranks and voted with Democrats against adding the amendment to a bill funding the Department of the Interior.

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# RECREATIONISTS SAY CLINTON/GORE RULEMAKING TORPEDOES PUBLIC APPEALS PROCESS AND SIDE STEPS REGULATORY FLEXIBILITY ACT

POCATELLO, ID -- Off-roaders and multiple-use recreationists say the Clinton/Gore roadless rulemaking process denies their right to appeal the administration's forest "land legacy" proposals. The Coalition also testified yesterday before a House committee that the Roadless Initiative failed to fully analyze economic impacts to off-highway vehicle (OHV) businesses.

A few years ago, this same apparent lack of a public appeals process in the so-called Salvage Rider, a proposal to harvest dead or dying trees, is what green groups decried as "logging without laws."

Historically, the forest planning process has allowed various interest groups and individuals to challenge or appeal government decisions they felt were deficient. These provisions of the National Environmental Policy Act were championed many years ago by greens because it gave them some say into how public lands were managed.

As Senator Larry Craig (R-ID) prepares to introduce legislation that will try and make sure that the public is not being bypassed by the administration's rulemaking process, some multiple-use interests find it strange that greens are crying foul because dirt-bikers and snowmobilers are saying they want to have access to environmental laws.

Don Amador, the western representative for the Blue Ribbon Coalition, says, "I find it ironic that the Clinton/Gore administration and greens are using the rulemaking process to deny us our rights to appeal deficient aspects of the closely linked Roadless Initiative, the Forest Planning Rule, and the new Road Transportation Policy."

"I wonder how my eco-friends would like it if James Watt (the embattled Interior Secretary under Ronald Reagan) was president and he used a rulemaking process to deny enviros their right to the public appeals process,?" Amador continued.

"When it has taken the Forest Service 3 years to do an environmental assessment for a single campground, I think the administration's misuse of the agency's rulemaking process to "salvage" and fast-track some sort of political legacy is really shortsighted and benefits neither wildlife or humans," Amador concludes.

In testimony before the House Small Business Committee, Adnea Cook, public lands director for the Coalition, said, "OHV related businesses in states where national forests present the dominate land base...are vulnerable to policy changes that will result in closures."

The Forest Service is required by tenets of the Regulatory Flexibility Act (RFA) to fully analyze economic impacts to businesses if the amount of harm exceeds \$100 million because it would constitute a major federal action. The agency has issued a general disclaimer for the roads rule, stating that it merely signified a change in definitions and therefore had no economic impact.

"The states of Colorado, Utah, Idaho, and Oregon each demonstrate well over \$100 million in economic activity from summer and winter OHV recreation. The Forest Service has generally chosen to ignore RFA...to minimize the impact of their proposed policies. Congress must take action to assure it receives the economic analysis reports required by RFA," Cook concludes.
